General responsibilities	<ul> <li>Management</li> <li>Administrative tasks</li> <li>The Director of Court:</li> <li>organises the administrating of affairs of the judicial institution;</li> <li>organises the use of the assets of the judicial institution (the court);</li> <li>prepares the draft budget of the judicial institution and submits the draft budget to the Minister of Justice;</li> <li>controls the budgetary funds of the judicial institution;</li> <li>is responsible for the organisation of accounting of the judicial institution;</li> <li>appoints court officers to office and releases them from office</li> </ul>
